ANAESTHETIC EXPERIENCE

As junior house anaesthetist and then as SHO at KCH, I gained experience in most specialities, including general, ENT, orthopaedic, gynaecological, dental and urological surgery. Many pain blocks were performed at this time under the guidance of Dr. Charles James.

As registrar, in addition to the above were included -paediatric, cardiovascular, neurosurgical, transplant and ophthalmological surgery. Experience was also gained in ICU, obstetric anaesthesia and analgesia, and in the pain clinic.

As senior registrar, I spent one year at the Queen Victoria Hospital, East Grinstead. This contains the S.E.Thames Regional Units for Burns, together with Maxillo-Facial, Plastic, Oral and Corneal surgery. Much experience was acquired, including hypotensive anaesthesia. During this time, I collaborated with Dr. Enderby to produce his chapter on "Deliberate Hypotension" in the 1980 Edition of 'General Anaesthesia' ed. Gray, Nunn and Utting.

The year included 3 months on the McIndoe Burns Unit as well as anaesthesia for all the specialities outlined above. During the year I attended the first 'Senior Registrar's Teaching Techniques' course at the British Postgraduate Medical Federation. This comprised eight afternoons of tutorials under the direction of Dr. John Heron (later to become BPFM director). The experience gained was invaluable and had a great influence on my own teaching techniques.

The next year was spent in Dallas. This was mainly a clinical appointment, which commenced with 6 months at the Veterans' Administration Medical Center. Here I was 'in charge' of the thoracic and neurosurgical anesthesia service, with great involvement in the supervision and teaching of residents. Two months followed at Parkland Hospital where I staffed residents in the urological, orthopedic and renal transplant rooms. I was also partly responsible for the Oral surgery service. The last four months were spent at the Children's Medical Center, which is the primary children's hospital in Texas (excepting Cardiac). Here I staffed residents for all specialities including Cranio-Facial and Plastics and also had some responsibility for the ICU. During the year I gave lectures on a regular basis to the residents and also to the Dallas County Anesthetic Society.

Following my return to the UK, I spent one year as senior registrar at KCH. During this year I set up a regular (once monthly) journal club and morbidity meetings. My final senior registrar job was at the Brook General Hospital where I spent 6 months covering the cardiothoracic and neurosurgical services together with ICU.

From January 1981 I have been consultant anaesthetist to the KCH group. My major interests have been in ICU, paediatric, hepatobiliary, vascular and urological anaesthesia. I jointly ran (with Drs. Fisher and Broadfield) the ICU at the Dulwich Hospital from 1981 to 1994. This was a 6 bedded unit with a special interest in renal and vascular patients. About 200-250 patients were admitted each year and all forms of monitoring and specialised treatment were carried out, eg. Swan-Ganz, cardiac output measurements, non-invasive oximetry, haemodialysis and ultrafiltration. The unit closed in 1994 and has been transferred to KCH. From 1985 to 1988 I was also Deputy Director of the KCH ICU, which is a very busy 8 bedded unit mainly catering for postoperative bypass patients, but also a considerable number of trauma, spinal surgical and paediatric patients.

ADMINISTRATION and MANAGEMENT

With the advent of Griffiths style management in the NHS, Care Group Directors (CGD) were established at King's College Hospital. From August 1987 I was joint CGD for Anaesthetics, Intensive Care and Theatres on the KCH and Dulwich sites with special responsibility for the latter. From July 1990, the operating theatres were split off from anaesthetics and ITU and I became the Care Group Director for Anaesthetics and ITU. I relinquished this post in May 1991 with the appointment of a full time Care Group Director for Critical Care Services.

Since March 1990 I have been BMA career grade 'place of work accredited representative' (POWAR) at Kings.

In December 1991 I was elected Chair of the District Staff Committee for Camberwell Health Authority, now King's Healthcare NHS Trust. I also chaired the King's Healthcare Joint Committee (joint staff and management group)

With the establishment of the BMA Local Negotiating Committee I was designated the Chairman from June 1993. I am also a member of the regional BMA LNC forum and Regional Consultants Specialists Committee (September 1993 onwards)

In September 1994 I was elected secretary of the BMA Regional Craft Specialists Committee for the South East Thames area and a place on the Central Consultants' and Specialists' Committee (CCSC). For one year I represented the CCSC on the anaesthetic sub committee of the BMA. These roles finished in May 2001 with the change in regional boundaries and the disappearance of the South East Thames Region.

In January 2001 I was appointed as Book Review Editor of the European Journal of Anaesthesia and in 2005 I was appointed to the editorial board of the International Journal of Surgery

In May 2001 I became a Primary Examiner and in 2005 a Final Examiner of the Royal College of Anaesthetists. In 2007 I become Head of the MCQ group for the Final FRCA

In July of this year was introduced the Multifunction Intubating bougie (MIB) which I invented in cooperation with a colleague. This is now manufactured and is being actively marketed by OGM Ltd. The MIB is now being marketed by Intavent Orthofix, one of the largest manufacturers of airway devices and of the original Laryngeal Mask Airway (LMA).

The MIB has several advantages over existing bougies such as the Portex Venn GEB and Cook Frova in that it is sterile, more cost effective, malleable, can detect CO₂ via capnography or indicator methods to confirm correct placement, less traumatic than the Frova and can be used as a one off NG tube.

Through contacts with the manufacturers I have pioneered the use of "depth of anaesthesia" monitoring at King's firstly with Auditory Evoked Potentials and now with BIS. Since April 2004 all my GA patients have had the benefits of BIS monitored anaesthesia. I believe that this is unique in the UK where the attitudes to BIS monitoring have been mainly negative.

KCH is to become one of only 2 centres in the UK to evaluate the Bilateral BIS monitor (early 2007)
